S. says you had a dance in your neighborhood lately you must be getting hard up also. I wrote to Mary about 4 weeks ago and have not yet got an answer please spur her up to a

mother she had better keep
you away from the Saloons
I can take care of myself
I do not associate with
the people here they are too
far below me and I can't
stoop. I have got my
first month's wages and
was at Faneville last Saturday
I pay \$2.00 per week for
board weekly and that takes
my money so I have not much
left. I got some new clothes
~~and~~ there is a big meeting
in progress here at this time
last Sunday I heard D. Mann
he preached a first rate sermon
I am getting along very well
with my school it is very large

well I must close this
time as it is getting late
give my love to all

T.S. says you had a dance in your neighborhood lately; you must be getting hard up also.

I wrote to Mary about 4 weeks ago have not yet an answer. Please spur her up to a sense of her duty. About bad company, tell Mother she had better keep you away from Abe Inlows. I can take care of myself. I do not associate with the people here. They are too far below me and I can't stoop. I have got my first month's wages and was at Zanesville last Saturday. I pay \$2.00 per week for Board weekly and that takes my money so I have not much left. I got some new clothes and there is a big meeting in progress here at this time.

I heard D. Mann he preached a first rate sermon. I am getting along very well with my school. It is very large. Well I must close this time as it is getting late. Give my love to all. I remain your affectionate brother.
