Dear Brother

I received your letter and the money that I paid to my landlady and was truly glad to hear from you and that you're all well. I was glad to hear that Abe's exhibition went off so fine. I should have liked to have been there. I might have spoken Hodge. I suppose you and Father have got rich hauling. Well I suppose if you have not at least you have made some.

I am not too well. At present my eyes have been hurting me severe. Lately though I manage to get my lessons. Last eve I was at a lecture delivered by Prof. Flowers, Bloomington, Ills on the subject of Phrenology. Well he did it \_\_\_\_\_ strong then examined some heads. It was laughable in the extreme.

School will be out this day four weeks to come. About 1 week of advance study and then he reviews. We will review then 2 weeks and it is kind of a bone and I suppose I can do all that I \_\_\_\_ do at home for they generally do not study any during review. And I think I will come home next Saturday a week, that is March 24. I have no money and I will not come till I get some. I don't know what I will owe my landlady. Send me ten of fifteen dollars if you can spare it. I want you to write to me soon and tell me what you can do. I am suffering some from a head ache and you will have to excuse me for the shortness of this letter. I may take a notion and stay till the term is out yet. What do you think about it. Well I must close. Give my love to all. From your Brother.
