

Dear Brother

I received your letter and the money you sent. I was very glad to hear from you and that you were well. I suppose you think I don't write very much. I tell you it don't agree with me to write and study also. All the time I haven't to study I ought to exercise. I am doing very well in my studies. I room was Wash Hull at Dr. White's. We have a fine room, a good religious place to room and a good set of students. Wiseman boards at the same place. I changed my boarding place from Mrs. Ross to Dr. White 2 weeks ago.

I have 3 studies this term. I am doing tolerably well in my studies. My standing for last term was Algebra 9.0, Latin 9.50, Greek, 8.0. They do very well except the last. You did not tell me how the school meeting went off. I wanted to hear from that, bad. Hen German is out here going to school. Harve came but went home again.

There is a tall time among the students going a swimming and boated riding on the Olentangy River. At my boarding place, we have two violins, a flute, and a guitar so we have plenty of music. There is one senior boarding at the same place named Griffith. We have 4 republicans and 2 filmonites. They (the Filmonites) hurrah for Bell and Everett and we hurrah for Lincoln and Hamblin. In this college there is no doubt but that there will be a change. I think we will lose our President and Dr. Harris is thinking of getting a position in Brooklyn New York at a salary of 4 or 5 thousand a year. Then there will be a change.

I got a letter from Wilbur lately. He got promoted he says out there at Lebanon. He thinks he will do lots better out at that city than he will do here. At present I don't know how the society is out there but I don't think it will hurt him to go in good society. Because I feel that I am at a loss when I am in good society.

Washington has for his studies botany, geology, geometry and will take astronomy and meteorology. He is out of the regular course. I find I can go right along with my class next year and teach. I will only have Latin, Greek, & History. We are at the 3rd book in Geometry. I tell you it is a splendid study, glorious in the extreme. Well I have told you all the news. I am somewhat divided in my opinion in what to do next fall whether to take the Presidency of some college or teach a common school. But I want to take the best course I can. There are about 300 students this time. The females have fallen off at the seminary. Give my respects to all the folks.
