We have been waiting for you to write to us, but perhaps you have been waiting for us to write to you as you had written the last letter and we did not answer that, the reason why we did not answer it was we heard you had enlisted and quit school, we did not know where to direct to, (and perhaps this won't reach you. We expected you to come and see us before you left Zanesville but you did not come. So after you left there we did not know where to write.

I commenced to write to you three weeks ago but Wilber's sickness kept me in suspense. We thought we would not write until we heard from him again but when we heard again it was to go to his funeral. I will not write the particulars as you will have them before this reaches you. Sump, it is a hard stroke on us all. We have the consolation that he is safe in Heaven. Spencer Ships came home sick 15 days ago. I have not seen him but I guess he was pretty sick. But he is gaining strength very fast now. I finished by school on the 8th of March. Had a pretty good school considering everything. It averaged 29 which is doing pretty well. Mary commences a summer term of 4 months on the 14th of this month.
