Letter from Dr. Luckett to James B. Finley

Dr. Luckett

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Louisville May 10th 1830

My dear friend & Mrs. —

I flattered myself before you left this place,
that on this time you would have seen the light
of my countenance in your city. I am sorry that
the very letter, which according to promise, and expect-
ation too, should have been my harbinger, only
announces my detention here, and must beg you to
receive it in substitution of my personal attendance
for the present. Not long after your departure, my
partner Dr. Johnston with his family, left this for
Wheeling, on a visit to his Father-in-Law, he de-
tained for Washington. His return will be in three
weeks and four days, by his own calculation, but
I add one more week for delays, lost time &c &c
If he return by the first of June, or before the
summer diseases commence, I shall instantly
avail myself of the interval, to visit you, if
only for three or four days, as it may only whet
my appetite for another in the fall, at which time

I wish to spend a month in the depicting room of your Medical school. I am very much pleased with the specimens of Cincinnati Methodism, so far, if all be correctly represented in our finds, now in this place, this tho' would be too much to expect, I would compound for one half, and then look for disappointment; I fear it was Yankee, which is too frigid a zone for my temperament, & would like to have them in Louisville, ^{both} in a religious and social point of view.

"O that mine enemy would write a book"

You may be apprised, that the reception here has been followed by a huge pamphlet—an exposé of the corruption &c of the N. E. Church and the party of the Radicals, and as this dropped still born from the press, unnoticed either by saint or sinner, they invited the good people, through the City papers, to hear two lectures on Church Government, and now having waited to see how incorrigible and stupid the people are not to be informed or enlightened, they have passed another on us. It begins most ludicrously with

"a publication giving an outline of the principles of the Associated Meth. Churches": what a pity that the people will be so foolish, as not to have heeded the first pamphlet, lectures, with the gross scandal from the Mutual rights, and usurpation, in which almost every one has dealt most literally out for the last months in this place. It is a most striking cause in this place, and if I know anything of the signs of the times, our Soil is not congenial to Radicalism. Then appears to be an awful pause in our own church, and I fear when ~~the~~ House is pulled down, for the erection of a new & larger one, we shall have a retrograde motion.

Should my Partner return in time, with a favorable combination of circumstances, I will let you know a few days before I leave this for Cincinnati. Enclose this, as it is only after being thus called off, that I have finished it.
