This is a good school Anna Cox boards here at Mrs Palmers Mrs Palmer is from Newport R.I. a fine lady her son was married 3 or 4 weeks ago. I suppose they will draft soon. Lewis was over in Jamesville last night and said there was a mob on 6th & 4th St. I am doing finely here. I will go along finely. Miss Tramm & Sloughton are good teachers John Stevens is here also McKimney & Young & Walker from New Concord. I am all right on the clothes question got my shirt was here & my coat. Well done too. Anna Cox wants me to come & get the school where she lives. I saw at Mr Daniel & Brockley's they have gone back to the Reg. Captain Chandler has gone. We have a nice Lyceum at the Normal We have plenty to eat & good too. I feel very well. I caught cold Thursday eve I was in the River
