Oxford April 27th 1834

Dear James — Your letter will inform you
that I have arrived here with my family.
We should have called on you last week
late Saturday evening — our clothes dirty.
I have been very unwell with my complexion
since I came here owing to fatigue
in moving — — We feel out of our
quickness of leaving so many friends
and not being able to give more
answers — We think of having a few
days meetings here. Will you come up
and help us — I am glad we should
be to see you — — I wish to have
my correspondence with A. Campbell
published in your paper. I have written you
an address on his influence and ~~some~~
~~some~~ subscription. I think it is some
most Campbell is replying — but I think I shall
know of his difficulty — I shall expect
his reply —

I trust Elizabeth would never hear of
the Methodist motto as their duty —
We had a pleasant quarterly meeting —

I wish to visit Connecticut soon. My
Brother thinks my affliction springs from a
deranged state of the Measles Membrane of the
Bowel and wishes me to consult Dr. Drake or
Cherry — and thinks I should be benefited
by the Warm Bath — Joseph's health is
improving — My health this the winter
was unusually good — I should like
to live a little longer to see the Schu-
ster of Eve — Shall we ever
meet and have an Old Shuhenwell
shout — I think it would do me good to
see Hannah and Mary Eliza and
John at our next meeting we must
try to accomplish it — I have some
unpublished essays which I will send
to your paper and with friends

and I am writing one immediately —
Let me hear from you — May send her
love — Yours sincerely —
