

July 9, 1865

Dear Frank

I am a citizen once more. I am living under my own vine and fig tree. I only need one thing to complete my household furniture and <u>that is a wife</u> -- Do you think I can succeed in getting one? Write to me without Reserve & tell me when you can be ready for me or whether you can't. Tomorrow is your birthday, I believe. I wish I could have been in a condition to come out to see you at that time. Well if I can't get ready as soon as you I want you to tell me when you want me to come.

I was mustered out on my birthday at Washington D.C. Was discharged the 30 day of June & was paid off the next day. I came immediately home. Attended Mr. Isaac Hull's funeral on last Sunday. On my way home, found Father, Mother Bro Jacob, Sisters Mary & Fla there. We had a grand 4 of July in Gratiot. The youth Beauty & chivalry of the band met there. The glee club from Brownsville sang well. Hon T.J. McGinnis spoke. Mr. T. Dick Student at Law read the Dec of Independence. We adjourned for Dinner. Took mine with Father, Mother, Mary & Fla. Each family took their dinner with them.
