July 30 1865 Sabbath Evening

Francis Parmeia dear

Yours of July 19 was received and read with real pleasure. But I think you would not talk as you do if I was where I could get my hands upon you. "Perhaps if you are not very hard to suit you will find a wife." Now Frank who asked for a wife? Did I? In my last? Did I tell you I wanted you? "Do you really want to marry?" O you impertinent, you make me blush. I was going to say. "Come out west before you marry won't you?" "I think you will enjoy yourself better than you did last winter or spring." You mean I will enjoy myself better "out west" than when I was in prison \* jails. Perhaps I may if "my wife" don't scold me.

I can get plenty of wives here without coming west. Maybe I'm mistaken for probably the fair girls of Ohio conclude I'm "caught" now & that is the reason they flock to see me. There were 13 or 14 came to see me the other evening. What do you think of me? Do you feel "bit?" I ask your pardon, dear, for my nonsense.

What do you think of the School if I can get it? Would you be satisfied? Your Bro George left here yesterday. He looks well. He went to Zanesville. He looked as if he had been asking for Grace to sustain him thro life and had been refused by his heavenly father-----in-law. Capt Leggett was with him. We had a pleasant time.

Would you still like to remain in Illinois or would you like to come to Ohio? "Perhaps I had better not hurry you; for fear your friends will get jealous, but I want to see you awful bad." I'm glad of the last sentence but you need not fear jealousy. Don't you think sisters feel bad to see a brother get married. I believe they do. George told me your youngest sister told him the last thing nearly she said "George you won't love us so well if you get married." Frank you can't tell how queer I feel at Jacob's wife.

I am sorry to tell you one thing. You asked when I was coming. Frank, I'm the most unfortunate of mortals. When I was at Annapolis, I sent my money by Express, fifteen hundred dollars. It has failed to come. I may lose it. It places me in a queer fix. I'd have been out before this I think if it had come on through, but that shall not interfere. I can't tell you when I will be out. Can you wait awhile for me? I am ashamed of myself with reference to you. I've been putting you off so long. If I can get that school, we can see by Spring what we can do. I was looking at your picture awhile ago with a glass. Made you look as large as life and I could not but think how long you had been waiting for me.

Well if one can't have things as they would wish it, they must do the best they can. I am well.
