Letter from William D. Barrett to James B. Finley

William D. Barrett

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Hillsborough 7th March 1837.

Dear Brother Finley

Yours of the 3d Inst came to hand
this day at Lewiston yesterday. We had great pleasure to hear from
you that you are in a fair & comfortable state of health. I hope
however with care you will soon recover and not
desiring to believe that you are suspended in indecision
as regards to believe it arises from the great desire I feel for
you to escape your nation in the present state which
while you have hitherto so bravely & well
acceptably filled, I hope therefore you will use all the
means possible to dispense your impaired services and to
brace the lungs which has for the last twenty years
resisted the force of your long & fatiguing exertions, which you
indeed at ^{last} succeeded in tranquility and peace from which
your mind and body your reader in other afflictions

our prospects on the Circuit begin to be seen with gloomy
the situation of the Circuit you know was bad & has been worse
it was truly discouraging but we set to work and preached
holy God's religion & visited delinquent & unorganized Classes
and espouse wicked Friends and now we have a prospect
of a harvest we have received perhaps forty Members
and still have in the worst condition of any we have had
our Congregation - the Presbyterians had swept the field
it was truly discouraging but now commands without
complaint and both our congregations began to
increase & now we have the church full & nearly
as every Sabbath we have enough the Circuit clerks
to preach here twice every Sabbath and things were in
a very different aspect the prospects now good. The Members
attend Class Meetings finely, and that you know is a good sign
but we pray such pity and look for better times. May
heaven send us a Missionary from our Bro D. I. who
comes next Saturday at Peterburgh and hope to hear
a good time. My colleague is a fine fellow with
rewards on the Circuit & is doing much good & ever good
old Bro Dunn is moving along slowly doing the best he
can he is in full health. He is no doubt a Superannuated
man but he does not believe it. The Rev'd is suffering for
want of more energy. This is known to all - there was
much kicking after Conference I felt much for him. The
people confidently looked for your return & the disappoin-
tment made some of them & themselves particularly about
Beliester - the old man is worn out in his station with
the people & how hard no one object to him as a man or
as a preacher further than they do not want one man
all the time they have heard him for more than twenty years
the best of men you know will wear out & there is the
welding of our Economy I say these things confidentially - there
is no man that I respect more than Father Dunn - ~~but~~
the fact is a hard case but so far I have got along with
him & the fortitude he as my warm friend in we have
on the last return also is much pain & friends from the same

you have many friends in the bounds of this Circuit
that often enquire after you and speak affectionately
of you & would be extremely glad to see you I hope
you will visit us some time in the year at our camp
Meeting if not before we shall be glad to see you &
if you conant preach -

We are in tolerable health

can do nothing with him, some time since I recommended

borrowed on his way to conference & promised to return it
on his return from conference without fail but he
had nothing about it Mr Smith has written to him on
the subject but can get no answer. he now says Clarke is
a Liege & then things are very hurtful to the cause of Religion
& his conduct less injured as much in this place - Please use
your influence with him on that subject.
