

I am exceedingly anxious to see my dear freeids on comme & to have my liberty. I am well now at least as much so as a presoner canbe my folks an well Jacob is getting well of his wounds received at Lawrence Kansas of Griantrells men Her was shot this the thigh in the breast & left arm breatly his arm I was sorry beo. was sick but glad to hear he had recov Eved I was again on duty. Our hopes of getting out of here soon are slim ended. I canturch and as The lows are against it. write to me zon the you don't get him at least once a week from my love to the members of your father family write Doon, I am dong the best I can. I should like to call on you in your large school. Till Houldat I wish her good luck in hers. farewell Thos I Amustrony



November 6, 1863

Libby Prison Richmond, Va. Nov 6, 1863

Dear friend Frank, I have waited for a long time for an answer to my letter; at last it came. I never got your other letter. Nearly 5 months I've been in this military prison. Have been in the hospital nearly 2 months with remittent fever. I am exceedingly anxious to see my dear friends once more & to have my liberty. I am well now at least as much so as a prisoner can be. My folks are well. Jacob is getting well of his wounds received at Lawrence, Kansas of Quantrell's men.

He was shot through the thigh, in the breast, & left arm, breaking his arm. I was sorry Geo. was sick but glad to hear he had recovered & was again on duty.

Our hopes of getting out of here soon are slim indeed. I can't write much as its laws are against it. Write to me even tho you don't get mine at least once a week. Give my love to the members of your father's family. Write soon. I am doing the best I can. I should like to call on you in your large school. Tell Huldah I wish her good luck in hers.
