Dear Father Hinley I seize the present opportunity of writing to you on the subject of my departure from Oxford. perhaps Dear Sir you may think it straining that I have come to the conclusion that it is best for me to leave Oxford but when you hear the reasons I hope that you will not think it strange or wrong. to say the least I have made it a subject of much prayer to God. I need not mention my last years afflictions unless I would just say that these past afflictions has so completely shattered my constitution. that I fear it will be sometime yet before I get the better of them: I have not tried to preach but since our Quarter meeting and it was only trying for I had not strength to preach. I can assure you that I have no alternative in going home & only to change my exercise and by so doing I believe by the blessing of God I shall regain my former health: and I further believe that preaching is injurious to my health while I am thus afflicted. I am well aware that a itinerant life is one that calls us to make many sacrifices and this I think I am willing to do. but I am conscious that he does not require us to labour when we are not able and I can say of a truth that such is the state of my sister's & my 15 month afflictions that I am conscious that I had better stop preaching until I regain my health. again I have been sick 15 months from home. and to lay sick much longer from home I cannot for I have no doubt but you know something of the difficulties of laying sick from home. and as I am not a healer to preach I shall start home in a few days. I hope that you will agree with me in this course for I do not wish to do every thing that is contrary to the Laws of the church or your views. but I must go home until I regain my health. when I have health I stand ready to march at any time: but when sick and afflicted as I have been and still am I must have some of my own views and in some degree pursue that course
