In reply to your letter, I will just say that the last letter we received from Lt. A. A. Taylor, was dated Jan 4<sup>th</sup> at which he was well, and although he did not speak of Lt. Armstrong in this letter, he <sup>has</sup> spoken of him very frequently in his letters previous to this date. In one of my brother's letters, he mentioned that Lieut. Armstrong was one of four, that composed his mess. I think you need not be uneasy, for if the Lieutenant had been sick, I know my brother would have mentioned that fact.

I will further say that the mails are more irregular now, than they were some time ago. The subject of exchange of Prisoners is now being discussed by the authorities both North and South, and it seems that an exchange is yet far from being effected.

Should you hear from Lt. Armstrong any time soon you will please inform me of the same. I can assure you that if any thing had gone wrong with any of the persons before named, I would have known it.
