Frank, Dear friend. Yours of Mar 13 was recd Apr 21. I was very glad to hear from you; did not say whether you was well or not. Your words were kind ones & full of encouragement. I hope all will come right. I try to be of good cheer. But one can't be blind to the realities. You know nothing of prison life in Richmond & God grant you never may know the horrors that I could tell you.

What do you do in your leisure time. I am studying grammar & French here. I should like to know what you are studying. Do you study music. I wish you would. Its so pleasant. But then maybe you would laugh at the idea of one in my position advising you who breathe not the air of a dungeon, but God's free air.

Frank I often think of you in my duties here if duties they could be called. Well if the government wants us out worse than they want us to stay in prison, why, we would be out. So its our duty to wait patiently & not grumble. I don't grumble. My hopes are bright for the future & for our future especially. May God bless you & preserve you in your trials. Yours as ever. T.
