On my buthday I was mearcerated in these walls June 2 5- 1863 - I may stay here for years and at present it looks pretty uncertain But I hope I shall be let out Soon but all is congecture - I have very little to hope for I'm very well , o've not heard on word from any of my friends since & Came from Winchester & Some days before The Battle - I have not eventeard from my regiment no not one word from any one please to write to me of you ex pect to get an anower from me you well have to Enclose in your answer to this an Envelope, Stamp, & 1/2 Sheet of paper Be Brief in your letters tell me about your home he it is all open. Ed & inspectio

My love to all of your Tell Heuldah peris on - my ward robe happens to be of not the most systemswe But I will tete you all about that when I Deserve - Pray that that may be soon We have prayers might & morning By The chaplains & two Sermons Sindaysyours as Ever Street to ato & Armstroy Federal Prisoner Libby prison Richmons ba via Forbress Monroe"

July 28th A.D. 1863

Dear friend Frank:

Ere this you've been apprised that I'm a Prisoner of War. One my birthday, I was incarcerated in these walls. June 25, 1863. I may stay here for years and at present it looks pretty uncertain. But I hope I shall be let out soon but all is conjecture. I have very little to hope for.

I'm very well. I've not heard one word from any of my friends since I came from Winchester & some days before the Battle. I have not even heard from my Regiment, no, not one word from anyone. Please write to me. If you expect to get an answer from me you will have to enclose in your answer to this an envelope, stamps, & 1/2 sheet of paper. Be brief in your letters. Tell me about your home & it is all open & inspected.

My love to all of you. Tell Huldah & Johnny that I cut quite a figure in prison. My wardrobe happens to be not the most extensive, but I will tell you about that when I see you. Pray that may be soon. We have prayers night & morning by the chaplains & two sermons Sundays.
