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Dear Father

Marytown Pa. Dec 26<sup>th</sup> 1847

Your kind favour was received  
some 3 weeks ago and I would have answered it  
much sooner but being then confined to my bed  
with the Bilious Congestion fever which lasted for 10 days  
from which I had not recovered before I was taken  
with a fever of an inflammatory character which has  
held me fast until within 3 days of this date  
Yours was a very sensible line for having been so  
much afflicted as I have been since Sept. last a kind  
look or friendly smile to say nothing of a kind letter  
from a parent was a relief that now saw he that feels  
it knowz. I have suffered much from disease this fall  
more than at any one time in my life before. Yet it seems  
to be my favoured lot at which I do not feel disposed to complain  
My mind has been firm & fixed in all my present trials  
and should I be called off without seeing one of my  
relations or friends save my own wife & children I could not  
feel forsaken but would lay down the conquest in my youth  
with a full assurance of meeting not only a few but  
many very many who have gone & soon would follow  
to bask in the unbounded goodness of a designing  
Creator. I am indeed thankful to have a parent that  
not only remembers me temporally but when lost to all  
sight of earth would not forget my cause & life before  
his master. I have often been pronounced unfeeling by  
acquaintances & others but my feelings now run like a stream  
but when once placed & never are forever lost & the feelings  
I imbibed in my youth are not lost but more firmly  
fixed & I do not presume to be governed by any feeling  
apart from judgement & duty. You will probably think I  
am making quite an exhibition on paper but suffice it to  
say I am now convalescent and hope to inform that I  
may be able for my daily avocation I pray this may  
reach you in good health I have not heard from any at home  
since yours

Wozil & Catharine are well and doing tolerable  
We will infallible more in some 3 or 4 weeks when  
we hope you will be able soon to pay us the 2<sup>d</sup> visit  
Linn flies fast but a few days ago as it were only a  
child and now since the 14<sup>th</sup> pass in my 28<sup>th</sup> year  
a dozen years more and where may we all be I come a hope  
and a fond hope it would be But Separated in life we  
can be hereafter never Accept the respects of Mr & Mrs  
Fisher. And our Best Wishes for your health and  
happiness having with a better prospect ahead
