Dear G. Father

I avail myself of another opportunity of addressing you. I have rec'd no news from you since you wrote to Chas. And me in conversation. Since that time we have been grievously afflicted. We have all shared in the fall fevers of this section & Margaret was in very low stage. But thanks to an ever merciful Creator we the creatures of transgression were not cut off but yet a longer probation allotted us. It has not been generally very sickly through this country this summer or fall. Yet amongst what cases do occur considerable fatality is connected with them.

We are at present making an effort to build a Methodist church in this place we have considerable opposition in it as we will have one in no other way than under the direction and superintendence of the M. E. Church as laid down in their discipline. A majority want a free church; but I for one will not give one cent for such an one. But as we are making an effort I want to succeed. And were I only clear footer I could make one out of 20 that could build a house ourselves and be independent of so much freedom as they think in this place. And as we have made the start and know we are right we will go ahead. If I had an assistant I would undertake to furnish the shingles for the building which would be 10 or 12 thousands. Shingles here are worth \$3. per thousand and that amount would be more than I could get under existing circumstances our sickness has cost me some \$30. Besides help in house and loss of time. If you can solicit \$15 of 20. in your region of labor and remit it to me you & I would furnish the shingles for the whole house on the ground. If this should meet your view send on if not suggest any thing and I will observe the lay of the ground. I went home to see you the very day you left for Columbus Mr Reid of this place told me on Sunday you would be up & as you did not come on Monday I started on Tuesday to see you. but you were gone I wished to see you much

I wanted to know about many things of you amongst which I
have named one. the very important one. I am very anxious to
have this place become more civilized and Christianized or
I can not think it a pleasant place to make a home for
a very long time. Ignorance and vice are the predominants
yet we have some good men in this country and plenty material
to make improvement on. Any amount you could raise for us
from among your friends or the friends of Christianity will
be cordially and thankfully received. Charles & family are well
and wish to be remembered to you. Please answer this as soon as
convenient and accept the best of wishes of myself and family
