Letter from John C. Brooke to James B. Finley

John C. Brooke

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August 29th 1814

Rev. Sir

I have been looking for word from you
but none yet and now I say we or not all
well some afflicted and first Mr. Quincy was taken
with a chill a few days since has had 2 or 3 chills
but with little opperrant fever comes on 3 hours
sooner every other day but when the chill is off
she is pretty smart Sarah Ann was taken 2 day
since with fever and has been quite sick but
I think it will assume the intermitent form
E Jane has been down with Swelled Lows & teeth
and gums but is better Asbury has had
a sever attack of the bowels and it has slidid
into chills or at least fever every night
there is no great amount of sickness in our
country so soon as I know old Mr Black is
still shied with the ague

we are through with Harvest have sent the
timbers for your Room Mr Lockwood has not
come to work yet but promises to come tomorrow
if he want come I will get some other hand
I shall have to by shingle for it those chambens
engaged have failed

our camp meeting was nothing to Brange of some
few said the church and some conversations
the Deacons made to the Bishop to make two
leavants out off Eaton one to be called
Leamore including all south of Eaton
except Antioch Eaton to have that &
Westville Morris New Hope and one other

appointment north I think the decision uncolled
for and that neither will be able to sustain them
but party feeling has prearmed it and a
desire to have Bob preaching at every appointment
(Bro^r Davis is not desired back on the Boston post
James is in at eastern getting logs & timber to build
with the Keith Charly one in Tolonoke health
Bay and Rothorne with the children are well
Andrew & Haunot also

I have batⁿ 2 bags nails 18 & 1.4 I sent to the
city for them as the askd here ~~6%~~ paid the cost
6% paid

I have spoken to Silas about surveying the land
again he has no objections but is not willing
to pay any more Br Streight says he will
care of you let him know in time
you had better have it done soon as Silas
wants to build his fence and so do we
& have not been at German Town and unless
we are better shall not be able to go soon
I dont feel well myself but do not
complain we have had a hard & long honest
and I am thin down

Campbell has cut between 50 & 60 cords and
unless he does better will leave soon 10 or 15^{ds}
in debt or I fear he must have meat &
bread or quit work and hardly work enough
to pay for that I am trying to push him
but he moves slow

now I have told you all & can think of worth
writing and close by saying

I am as ever yours till death John O'Brooke
