My Dear Uncle

You will be suprised on the receipt
of this letter datea from this place as we have
movea back I hope & trust the imptaining hand
of providence is in ouer me I do assure you that
I was verry tired of the Springs I haad not the privilege
of hearing a sermon once in six months a privilege
I prize very highly I was discontented & unhappy all
the time we livea there I never livea a manng as low
& wicked a community in my life professos of religion
dancing playings cards & drinking & yet keeps in the
Churc I have found a but few honest spirots not one
associate that knew any thing a bout experimental
religion. inasea there is so much infidelity &
skepticism in this country it is diffcullt to pass without
being temptea with unbelief My dear Uncle I want you
to remember me & mine at a throne of grace that
we may have a home in Heavins I ask god to give me
that wisoun that cometh from a bone that I may inablea
to discharge my duty to my family I do know that I
woud that I woud be an Isrealite inasea in whome there is

guileg I feel a grata responsibility resting upon me
as a mother as my husband is not religious
it devolves upon me to set a good example
It is my pray to god to give me ability to
discharge my duty in all my relations to life

My dear Uncle I owe you an apology for not answering
your letter of December 25th as it was near & neer with
minglea feelings of joy & sorrow I always take a cage
when I get a letter from you to think I am thrown
a mornng stranger that comes nothing for me nor
my family I never lived in a place before but my family
connection was known oh I wished while reading your
letter speaking of James Cheever's visit to your house that
I could have been one of the circle

at the time received yours letter I had come
in heare to pay a visit my two eldest daughters was
a going to school as it was vacation I came in to
spend the holidays with them it was all bustle & confusion
all the time of part of writing until I would go home
& after I got home we commenced preparing to
move & procrastination has put it off until this time
I hope you will look over it that it will not be too
late make amends for the past since it woudl be
as I had promised to send the money for the repository
immediately I have received it of the Navacette also
the present of Books you sent me I think I received
them on the fifth or sixth of this month for which
I feel thankful & they will be a grate source of pleasure

to me although it made me feel melancholy when
looking at your sickness it is so natural yet you
have changea some I have told Mr Hatt after that
over son looks like you as soon as he saw it he
saw the sickness I will inclose three rollers to you
in this letter hoping that it will go safe

as to the money we sent last year Mr Pope the Postmaster
of this city inclosed a two dollar bill & sent it I hope
there will be no difficulty about it you will please
write & let me know as soon as you get this as I
shall be anxious to hear all about it

The weather is beautiful at this time the trees &
shrubbery are in full bloom in a short time the
weather will be very warm here on last Sabbath

I went to heare the Episcopal church as our Minister
was gone but returned in time to preach at the
African Church at those I have not witnessed such
a sight for a grate while a bout 20 shouting at one
our Minister is a talents & an energetic pious man
I sit & listen to him in breathless silence some times
& think how can people resist such powerfull & forcible
Practical Preaching as he told them a Sunday
night if the Church was not so barren whith
the Minister he might preach his life a way & he could
affect no good the Church is in a cold state here
they have not an efficient male Member I think there
is a number of fifty members

The Presbytery has been in session for the last few
days I was gratified while reading the last Navacette
