Dear Sirs yours of the
31st of Dec. come to hand by
the course of mail, and as you
seem to think something is the
matter. I have chosen the earliest
opportunity to reply. The reason
why we have not replied before
this time was that we had not
your address. You speak of having
written two letters. We had received
but one. Which ~~one~~ was some
time before you left Columbus. And
by the time we were ready to write
we learned that you had left.
I intended writing to T^h B^renton Conf.
but neglected, I wrote to Bro. Monroe
but never received any reply. Since
which time of Oxford you were
all along unwell & I have been trying
to do the best I could among
the right pieces of W^m. Virginia.

You may have seen by the minutes of the Western Virginia Conf. that and minister
was soon what changed at the last Conf.
& that I am on the Poolesburg Dist.
I live in this place last year but
my work is much more convenient than
it was last year. But notwithstanding
this it is still inconvenient & laborious.
My Dist. extends on the Ohio River from Pt.
Pleasant (mouth of Great Kanawha) to
Fish Creek. which is 20 miles from Wheeling.
including a distance of One Hundred and
Fifty miles on the Ohio River. & extending
back to a corresponding distance in the
mountains. The spirit of division which
has prevailed in this country is not manif-
ested in the publick assemblies as heretofore
but whenever there is any opportunity the
deep seated enmity of Southernism exhibits
itself. But we have no fears of the
final success of Old Methodism, in this
country.

You enquire about my
intention with regard to returning to the
Ohio Conf. In reply I can only say that
I see no way of getting back honorably
and I shall not condence to the breaking
poses of locating for the sake of getting

back. I have marked out my course as
the only way that I can do. The Bishopps
have been unable to believe ex: it seems
by transfer. I have therefore determined
to remain until after general Conference
if I cannot be transferred before that
time. And then I shall locate to remain
located. It will be however a very con-
siderable stay upon me to stay until then
for the Report in this country is very
limited & I have Mother & Mary to support
& also my own Father which will not
only take all the gasterys of fit but will
take all the loss charge which I can
earn. else where I fear it will
involve me in debt.

If you speak of coming into this country
in the Spring, we will be much grati-
fied if you can make it convenient to
come at Conference. The Western Virginia
conference will be held in this place
the 5th of June. Can you come at that
time.
