## Letter from Robert W. Finley to James B. Finley

April 16. 1825 - London

My Dr Son James) On last evening I received yours bearing date March 21. 1825, was thankful ~~you~~ that you were all alive, & that god was still with you, & that the Kingdom of grace among you was like our fruit Trees in full bloom. I have been free from Rheumatism for some months past, & enjoyed measurable Health, till a few weeks ago. I was caught out in one of the most <sup>violent</sup> Storms I remember ever to have been exposed to. The rain poured down from water Spouts, a violent wind, trees falling all round on every hand. An alarming storm & Hail, some places three mouth Deep, but in the midst of danger the good Lord had prepared a Parvaire, to which I fled & found a refuge from the storm. I caught a cold from which I <sup>have</sup> not yet recovered. Our next Quarterly meeting will be at old Ken Amrines on Hill Creek, & a Camp meeting likewise. It will commence on Thursday evening at 5 O'clock to continue till Monday. you are sensible the settlement is new, their farms small, green scarce, & being before harvest, no pasture. Govt Provision will be made for Purchasers Horses. & public notice given for all others that may attend to come prepared to look themselves & horses. & to have no dependence on the vicinity for assistance. Postponed a letter to London, to let me know what numbers of our Brethren will attend. & it will <sup>be</sup> proper ~~for~~ them, their horses will be the worst. There is good work at Brother Amrines, some <sup>time</sup> ago I took in the other night meeting, & left round seven, there is good work in several places of the Circuit, our officers need ~~and~~ their services. Come prepared for that purpose.

I shall have no objection to going home with you from  
that place, if you can ~~the~~ supply my place in my ab-  
sence for the Little factions of the People, but I am afraid  
that will be hard to do as the Lord hath given favour in their  
sight, as he did Joseph in the eyes of Pharaoh. My  
College is looking & not turning ground in the affections  
of the People. No person ever more sensible felt the approach  
of mortality than I do, altho' I speak about 8 or 9 times every  
round. I look often before me, & feel myself not only touching  
back of my children, grand & great grand children, all my rela-  
tions & acquaintances, but the whole human race family, & can say  
from my heart, come Lord Jesus, come quickly, for I scarcely  
desire the moment to get, to those all means to make me more soul-  
ful & more fit for my almost year.  
My resignation I suppose you know,  
that Patience you must over let go.

Remember me to Hannah, gone my nice, brother Horner &  
his companion. Every else that may engage after my mind
