Letter from John McLean to James B. Finley

John McLean

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Washington

26 April 1825

My dear friend,

I enclose you a paper in which, you will see that both you and I, are now such things as to be expected from the world in which we live. Those who have the least honesty and patricianism, are always the first to suspect others.

I have written a letter to the editor in which I have stated the facts - that the office was abolished, and that you now discharge the duties gratis which formerly devolved on Mr. Chase

as agent. And that I did not know
of this order until more than
three weeks after it was made.

Mr Calhoun & the papers, when
he was on the eve of his journey
to the mountains - made the order,
signed it, but the letter was sent
to me, it seems, to frank the next
morning after his departure. I
did not observe the letter though I
franked all the letters from the War
Department in the absence of Mr
Calhoun. It was not until his
return, that I was informed of
the order which had been made
respecting Mr Shows.

My family are in usual health.
Our contemplated visit to Ohio
this season is doubtful. My
family is very large to take
them all with me, would subject

me to an expense which I could
not conveniently meet and to leave
a part behind would be very
disagreeable.

I find with all the economy I can
use, that my expenses since I have
been here, have exceeded my salary.
But I am determined to live within
my means, if, is consequence of it
I should incur the charge of meafy.
I had rather be just, than generous
without justice. Remember me affec-
tionately to Sister Dixley. Remem-
ber me and mine.
