I received your Letter in November Boreing Date 25th and was much pleased to ^{not} from you and as you was not at Columbus I did not hasten to write and Answer you, thinking that I would give you time to get back again, Now Bro Finley I will say that I am thankfull to you for your kind wishes for me and my family and I do pray that God ^{my} bless you and ade you by his haley spirit that in the discharge of your duty to those poor Convicts in Prison he may cause thone wants to melt as wax before the word with ^{my} you deliver for thone benefit and while you are laboring for thone souls may God fill your hart with the Unction of the haley Spirit Now Bro Finley I do thank God that I am enabled through mercy to inform you that I am on board of the old Ship yet and am an able Bodied man able to do duty below and a Loft both sides and a Middish and some times when I am a Loft I feel much like Enyng out Land O far it seems as though I can all most discern the light that Eluminates the Entrance into port
