Dear Sir I have rec^d your Letter about
The Tenth Day of March and was very
Much pleas^d To hear that Mr hind was
a Change Man and I am willing to do any
thing I can do in the way of getting him
out of Prison the reason for not sending
this petition sooner was our Court was
to be held in this place and thought
that the most favourable time to
Circulate the petition and accordingly I
do I saw a Letter to day with Col Dewey
sent to Col Frayer on the subject and
in that Letter he wishes to know where
his Children are I have not seen Lanson
for some time the last time I saw
him he told me he was to work at the
Center of Shalersville the next oldest was
Living with Mr Case the next was in the
Poor house and the youngest with Mr
Austin in Rootstown I have consulted with
a number of Friends and they all thought
that the names that I had on the Petition
was sufficient to grant him a pardon
