Dear Mother

You may remember  
my conversing with you when in Columbus  
last spring, in reference to the case of John  
Robinson - a colored man in prison from  
this county. Divers matters have prevented  
my attending to this case till now. I would  
now like to know if you think his pardon  
advisable. You thought him injured by ill  
treatment, here is he? & would that injury  
render it improper - for him to be at  
large. I would like to have your opinion  
& the opinions of the officers you may think  
proper to consult.

If you report favorably, I shall proceed  
immediately with a petition, which will  
be readily signed by as good men as there are in  
Ohio. - If the Governor pardons  
him I think I shall employ him, till he can  
do better. I do not mind out a man at all,  
but charity might be served.

My health is about so-so - certainly  
worse upon the approach of cold weather. it gets no  
worse. My superannuated operation is a very

painful one, but I am every day better, & satisfied that  
the Conference served me right. If however I had received  
an appointment, I should have gone to work cheerfully  
& sold on while I could.

I am living on a farm 7 miles from the City  
& of course have no news. - From my little intercourse  
with the City, I am persuaded this will be a good  
year for religion in Cincinnati.

If you will drop me a line at your  
earliest convenience I will lose no time in  
attending to that poor-fellow's case.
