Most Worthy Brother

I Received your most obliging letter a few days since, and was much pleased to hear from you and to learn that your health was improving and that you were again able to take the field in defense of the cause of humanity; myself and family are enjoying a reasonable portion of the blessing of health at this time and should be pleased to learn that this has found you and yours in the same state of health; I have but very little to write to you at this time as I presume you have received the few lines I addressed to you last week I presented your request to our Division Saturday evening Nov 24 the Brothers appeared all very happy to hear from you but at the same time felt much grieved to part with our most affectionate Brother but after giving a brief explanation of the cause you had for removing your membership from our Division the Brothers appeared all very willing that a card should be granted to you which I send you enclosed in this letter,

Thursday Evening No<sup>m</sup> 29<sup>m</sup> we have a public  
meeting at our hall Mr. S. Galloway and others  
will address the people in part on the  
Washingtonian principle when the pledge will  
be introduced for signers in order once more  
to build up this old society that has almost  
sunk into oblivion, let us resort to any and all  
means that are honorable to subdue this mighty  
evil; if men will not join the Sons of Temperance  
let us try to get them to join the pledge and  
quit drinking whisky, all classes are uniting  
with us in this glorious enterprise the  
aged and the young and particularly  
the ladies, for fear I may tire you with  
my broken thoughts I shall say no more at  
this time,

I wrote to you in my other letter that you  
was about \$2.00 in arrears but on examining the  
books myself Saturday evening last I find that you  
are but "21cts in arrears including the card  
would make about "33cts" I wrote to you something  
about sending me a temperance paper if you  
have ordered it I will remit the money to you  
but if you dont find it convenient let me  
know in your next how it may be obtained
