January 18th 1826

Dear Br. — In great haste I set down to write you a line, to be mailed at Urbana after having written to you to send an Indian to Oxford to my care, and told you of the prospect of his being taught, in the college gratis, I had reason to expect you would send one. and I still expect you will, if providence favor the design. but I think it my duty to inform you that my wife has been afflicted almost ever since Conference, and it is now doubtful whether she will ever be able to attend to the duties of House keeping and therefore I think it would be best for you not to send one here til you hear from me again.

I should be glad you would write and let me know whether it is your wish to send one to Oxford, if you wish to do so, I will make any arrangement you think proper, but I do not expect we shall be able to keep hose before Spring. I can however likely make arrangements to have him Boarded with a decent family, till my wife gets better health if ever she does. Write, and I will do as you shall think proper. I remain with due respect yours in the bonds of the gospel.
